EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AND KEY JUDGEMENTS

- 1 - Sudan's war generated a direct interstate warning: Chad accused Sudanese military or allied aircraft of striking a vehicle convoy more than 100 km inside Ennedi Est and placed its forces on high alert. Responsibility and the convoy's identity remain unverified. **MODERATE CONFIDENCE ON THE CHADIAN ALERT; LOW ON ATTRIBUTION**
- 2 - Fighting over the Libya-Darfur logistics corridor intensified: Sudan's Joint Force claimed it destroyed an RSF convoy, captured vehicles and drone equipment and detained 70 fighters. Reuters could not independently verify the claim and the RSF did not respond. **MODERATE-LOW CONFIDENCE**
- 3 - The DRC and AFC/M23 agreed a sequenced negotiation roadmap: the parties also backed standardised ceasefire-violation reporting and a mechanism to review implementation. A first verification mission was scheduled for Minembwe. **HIGH CONFIDENCE ON THE AGREEMENT; MODERATE ON IMPLEMENTATION**
- 4 - Political structures are hardening on both sides of regional fractures: Sudanese anti-war groups rejected Abdel Fattah al-Burhan's domestic dialogue and proposed three alternative tracks, while Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger prepared the inaugural AES confederal parliamentary session. **HIGH CONFIDENCE**

REPORTING BASIS

HUMINT: No authorised HUMINT reporting was available for this edition.

OSINT: Reporting was checked against attributed Chadian and Sudanese statements, Reuters verification language, the joint DRC-AFC/M23 process, Qatar-linked reporting, the Nigerien state news agency and current UN figures. Claims by belligerents remain labelled and are not treated as confirmed battlefield facts.

SAHEL

1 | CHAD / SUDAN - N'Djamena alleges cross-border drone strike

OSINT | RELIABILITY B | CREDIBILITY 3 | OFFICIAL CHADIAN CLAIM

Chad's General Staff said a vehicle convoy in Ennedi Est, more than 100 km from the Sudanese border, was struck by aircraft and drones belonging to the Sudanese Armed Forces or allied groups. The statement, first reported during the window, said all Chadian units had been placed on high alert and warned Sudan's belligerents against further territorial violations. Chad reserved the right to defend its integrity. The Sudanese army had not responded at publication.

The incident followed reported air attacks on 20-21 August against suspected RSF supply traffic near the frontier. Sudan has previously accused Chad of enabling UAE support to the RSF through Amdjarass and N'Djamena; Chad and the UAE deny this. Neither the identity of the targeted convoy nor responsibility for the strike was independently established.

Assessment: The alert raises the risk of direct Chad-Sudan military friction and tighter controls along a border already carrying refugees and military logistics. A repeated strike or Chadian interception could trigger retaliatory action without either government intending a wider war.

2 | MALI / BURKINA FASO / NIGER - AES confederal parliament opens

OSINT | RELIABILITY B | CREDIBILITY 2 | OFFICIAL INSTITUTIONAL REPORTING

The heads of Mali's National Transition Council and Burkina Faso's People's Legislative Assembly arrived in Niamey for the first confederal parliamentary session of the Alliance of Sahel States, scheduled for 24-29 August. Niger's Consultative Council for the Refoundation is hosting. The event formalises another layer of coordination among the three military-led governments after their break with ECOWAS.

Assessment: The body is more significant as an institutional-consolidation signal than as an independent legislature. Watch for harmonised security law, defence oversight provisions, confederal financing and measures affecting movement or trade with coastal states.

3 | MAURITANIA

4 | SUDAN - Joint Force claims major interdiction near Libyan border

OSINT | RELIABILITY B | CREDIBILITY 3 | BELLIGERENT CLAIM / UNVERIFIED

A Darfur armed-group coalition fighting alongside the Sudanese army said it destroyed an RSF convoy in the northern desert linking eastern Libya and western Sudan. Its spokesperson claimed 49 combat vehicles were destroyed, 30 vehicles and a fuel tanker captured, 70 RSF personnel detained and drone batteries seized. The force acknowledged four fatalities. Reuters could not independently verify the figures and the RSF had not responded.

Assessment: Even partial confirmation would indicate increasing contest over one of the RSF's strategic resupply corridors. The drone-related equipment claim, if verified, would also support the assessment that the route carries higher-value technical materiel as well as fuel and ammunition.

5 | SUDAN / ETHIOPIA - Anti-war coalition rejects al-Burhan dialogue

OSINT | RELIABILITY B | CREDIBILITY 2 | JOINT POLITICAL STATEMENT

Sudanese political and civil groups concluded consultations in Addis Ababa by rejecting army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan's proposed domestic dialogue. They argued it would legitimise military rule and de facto territorial partition. Their alternative calls for three concurrent tracks: urgent humanitarian action, a permanent ceasefire and an exclusively civilian political process. Military factions would participate only in the first two tracks.

Assessment: The position clarifies a substantial civilian bloc's red lines but widens the gap between army-led domestic talks and internationally supported sequencing. Multiple mediation formats remain vulnerable to forum-shopping by the belligerents.

6 | SUDAN - Displacement outside formal sites remains undercounted

OSINT | RELIABILITY A-B | CREDIBILITY 2 | WHO / IOM / FIELD ACCOUNTS

Current reporting highlighted displaced households living with relatives, in rented rooms or unfinished buildings outside regular aid distributions. WHO estimates cited in the report put humanitarian need at 33.7 million people and urgent health-service need at 21 million. IOM recorded about 8.88 million internally displaced people and 4.24 million returnees in April-May. Thirty-seven percent of health facilities were reported out of service.

Assessment: Off-camp displacement creates a persistent collection and targeting gap. Return movements into damaged urban areas should not be interpreted as durable recovery where water, power, healthcare, education and unexploded-ordnance clearance remain inadequate.

7 | ETHIOPIA; ERITREA; SOUTH SUDAN; DJIBOUTI; SOMALIA; SOMALILAND

No material, independently verified new development was identified inside the strict reporting window. Somalia reporting published before the cut-off was not carried forward without a new increment.

CENTRAL AFRICA AND GREAT LAKES

8 | DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO - Government and AFC/M23 agree negotiation roadmap

OSINT | RELIABILITY A-B | CREDIBILITY 1-2 | JOINT PROCESS / MULTIPLE OUTLETS

The Congolese government and AFC/M23 agreed a roadmap of sequenced steps and timelines under the Doha peace framework after consultations in Switzerland. They also backed a standard method for reporting ceasefire allegations and a mechanism to review implementation. Qatar, the United States, Switzerland, the African Union Commission and Togo participated. A first ceasefire-verification mission was due in Minembwe, South Kivu, on 24 August.

Outstanding disputes include sanctions against M23, detainee releases and the timing of political reforms. Previous agreements have not prevented renewed fighting.

Assessment: The verification architecture is the most operationally important element. Progress will depend on access to contested areas, agreed incident standards and whether findings produce corrective action. Failure at Minembwe would quickly erode confidence in the roadmap.

9 | CAMEROON

No material, independently verified new development was identified inside the strict reporting window.

REGIONAL INTELLIGENCE ASSESSMENT

Sudan's western externality: The alleged Chad strike and claimed Libya-border interdiction show the conflict increasingly organised around cross-border depth. Supply-route pressure is now directly interacting with Chadian sovereignty and refugee-hosting burdens.

Peace-process verification: Both Sudan and the DRC demonstrate that political roadmaps without field monitoring have limited value. The DRC mechanism is comparatively concrete; its credibility will be determined by access, incident attribution and compliance rather than signatures.

Competing regional architectures: The AES parliamentary session consolidates a separate Sahel institutional bloc while Togo participates in DRC mediation. Security diplomacy is becoming more networked and less centred on legacy regional organisations.

Collection caveat: Reporting silence across several priority states does not establish operational inactivity. Rural incidents, especially in the Sahel, Cameroon and Cabo Delgado, often emerge after the daily cut-off.

INDICATORS TO WATCH | NEXT 24-72 HOURS

- Chad / Sudan: imagery, casualty data, convoy identity and any Sudanese response to the Ennedi Est allegation.
- Chad border: force deployments, air-defence posture, closures or restrictions affecting refugees and trade.
- Sudan / Libya corridor: independent confirmation of captured vehicles, detainees or drone components; RSF counterclaims or retaliation.
- Sudan political track: army response to the Addis Ababa statement and attempts to merge or compete with international mediation formats.
- DRC / Minembwe: whether the verification mission deploys, who participates, access conditions and publication of findings.
- DRC / AFC-M23: detainee releases, sanctions disputes, ceasefire incidents and timetable compliance.
- AES parliament: adopted rules, confederal security legislation, funding decisions and measures affecting ECOWAS relations.
- All regions: delayed confirmation of attacks, displacement or infrastructure disruption not visible at cut-off.

ANALYTIC STANDARDS AND CAVEATS

Confidence: High = strongly corroborated by credible reporting or direct documentary evidence. Moderate = credible but with meaningful gaps. Low = single-source, contested or weakly corroborated.

Grading: Reliability assesses the source; credibility assesses the information. Official, community and armed-party statements remain attributed unless independently verified. Reporting silence does not establish operational inactivity.
